#### What does your research explore/investigate?

My research explores prosocial development, particularly the mechanisms underlying helping in early childhood. Specifically, I am looking at how prosocial emotions motivate children to maintain and repair social relationships.

## What do you love best about being a researcher?

What I love about being a researcher is that it allows me to be creative in planning experiments as well as the freedom to ask new questions and discover new phenomena. I very much enjoy running studies with toddlers/children and to learn how they might see the world. Finally, I enjoy the social aspect of being a researcher such as discussing critical topics with the team and teaching/learning from students.

# What does your research explore/investigate?

My research explores two main areas, early childhood intervention, inclusion and the transition to school and teacher education with respect to preservice teachers' epistemic cognition and preparation to teach in inclusive classrooms. The project that is most exciting me at the moment is a collaboration with five Nordic countries exploring the politics of belonging and inclusion in early childhood education.

# What do you love best about being a researcher?

Two things really. First, I love working collaboratively in research teams, learning from others and hopefully also making my own contribution to the team. Second, the hope that my research will make some small difference in people's lives.

## What does your research explore/investigate?

I'd like to understand how small aspects of perception and cognition (e.g., perceptual learning and speed of processing) influence everyday behaviours and abilities like learning to read; and, in turn, how these relate to learning and life outcomes, and well-being.

It's really two things: (1) supporting others in developing their own skills and direction, and (2) discovering (or maybe just thinking about) how cognition fits together to underpin behaviour - pretty sure it's in that order!

# Special Issue: Frontiers in Psychology Early Social Experience: Impact on Early and Later Social-Cognitive Development

As social and cognitive development take place in human social interaction, this special issue aims to bring together research that addresses how infants' and young children's social environments shape their early and later social and cognitive development. We aim to draw on longitudinal and cross-sectional research using a variety of methods and theoretical perspectives in order to inform how infants and children build complex social skills, such as an increasingly complex understanding of other social beings.

**Research methods may include but are not limited to:** surveys, lab-based tasks, longitudinal research; neuroimaging, or large cohorts.

**Possible topics include but are not limited to:** atypical or at-risk populations; bioecological systems; collaboration; communication; contingency; cultural contexts; developmental cascades; digital learning contexts; dyadic interactions; emotional regulation; imitation; individual differences; ingroup/outgroup; joint action; neural synchrony; parent-child interactions; parenting; peer cooperation; social cognitive development; social learning; social mirroring; social networks; social rejection; teaching & learning; theory of mind.

**Position Description:** Postdoc Researcher in Computational Modelling of Multimodal Communication in Face-to-Face Dialogue: We seek a Postdoctoral researcher for the project Understanding the Emergence and Maintenance of Cross-modal Convergence in Dialogue. Mutual understanding in dialogue requires convergence on mental representations of meaning between interlocutors. Such convergence emerges over time through the close coordination of interlocutors in real-time, and through building common ground by means of gesturing and speaking. Earlier conversational research has identified mechanisms of

common ground building. However, it remains unclear how and when speakers converge when referents are signalled through naturalistic multimodal behaviours (i.e., speech and gesture). The project aims to advance the status quo by investigating the dynamics of multimodal referential processes and, ultimately, by developing a computational model powered by machine learning that captures multimodal referential convergence in dialogue.
