**Nichole Breeland**

#### What does your research explore/investigate?

I recently completed my PhD under the supervision of Associate Professor Annette Henderson in the Early Learning Lab. Upon completion of my PhD, I shifted from academia to industry. I currently conduct user experience (UX) studies at the Phoenix User Research Centre in Phoenix, Arizona. Specifically, I conduct product and usability testing, and safety evaluations for products such as medical devices and head-mounted displays (e.g., virtual reality equipment).

My PhD research investigated children's social-cognitive development across the first two years of life. Specifically, I examined how parental and individual-specific factors impact children's mental representations of shared goals and ability to attain shared goals (i.e., cooperate) with others. My research also focused on identifying a "cooperative phenotype" that examined the relationships between children's social-cognitive abilities (e.g., intention understanding, attention capacity, and person perception) and their cooperative behaviours.

Do you have any advice for Early Career Researchers/Post-docs/PhD candidates? The time you spend completing your PhD should be a time to learn about yourself. Try to focus more on finding out what you enjoy and what you don't, rather than focusing on doing everything to perfection. Relatedly, embrace opportunities to learn about a new research area or career path by attending a webinar, presentation, etc., that may not be directly relevant to you. You never know where you will find your niche or meet a potential collaborator!



Molly Speechley

Molly received her Bachelor of Psychology (Honours) from Griffith University in 2020 and is now completing her PhD under the supervision of Dr Jaimee Stuart and Associate Professor Kathryn Modecki.

#### What does your research explore/investigate?

My main work is in the developmental gender identity process and experiences of gender diverse peoples. My original PhD was going to examine only a small slice of these experiences, but after a lot of reading in the earliest days of my candidature, we felt that the concept as a whole demanded a far more thorough investigation. To that end, my research seeks to build an understanding of these myriad processes by systematic, qualitative review, working toward eventual quantitative investigation into this space. I also work with my PhD supervisor in areas of parenting, and cyberpsychology.

#### What drew you to work in human development?

An incredible lecturer in my second year of university, whose passion basically rerouted my entire academic career. A lot of questions I had (and still have) about psychology made a lot more sense when I began to consider them from a developmental viewpoint. To some extent, I'm not sure it's possible to study any field of psychology without considering the developmental angle.

**The self** (e.g., narrative identity, identity development, social self-concept, body image, temperament, conscientiousness, personality)

**Social, emotional, and moral development** (e.g., wellbeing, empathy, prosocial behavior, bullying, emotion regulation, coping, resilience, anxiety, depression, suicidality, addiction, substance use)
